
Dis Manibus: A Taxonomy of Ghosts from Popular Forms

This document emerged as a consequence of a series of seminars presented by Professor Williams and Dr. Schäfer at the Alchemist's Shack II sessions during the summer of 2012 for the project *Opus Magnum: Theatrum Chemicum Britannicum* at the noted Mildred's Lane Project in Pennsylvania. Here, over an intensive three-week period, a group of graduate students and artists referred to as Mildred's Lane Fellows considered the different contexts and behaviours of ghosts and ghost-seeing from a range of popular cultural forms.

This paper, the essay and art-work is the result of those discussions, collaborations and deliberations.
